

6. Attainment by gender (Tables 1d & 2a)

As in previous years, girls continue to do better than boys in all headline measures. The gender gap for Attainment 8 has increased to 5.6 points, an increase of 0.3 points. The gender gap has also increased for the English and maths attainment measure to 6.8 percentage points, as shown in Figure 9, an increase of 0.6 percentage points since 2017.



Figure 9: Performance in threshold measures by gender







Figure 6: Attainment at key stage 4 by disadvantage Percentage of pupils achieving each indicator: England, 2013/14 (2014 methodology)

One column should be headed 'Internal school factors' (e.g. interactions with teachers, peer group etc) and the other 'external factors' (e.g. poverty at home, wider community).

Challenge what is the most important factor? ? If you wanted to research the most important factor, which method would you use and why? How would you go about it?

- Internal factors relate to what happens within school and educational settings themselves.
- They can be to do with the interactions between people such as fellow students or teachers.
- They can also be related to the way schools are organised and run, the rules and procedures within them.

- External factors relate to what happens outside of schools and educational settings.
- They are usually linked to experiences that students have in their own homes.
- They can also be related to how the students themselves are brought up.


