<p>Funding is received in March following the September intake. Effective use of funding to support catch-up includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Individual tuition in addition to classroom teaching • Intensive small-group tuition as an intensive programme • Wide range of in class support in different subject areas <p>English 2017-2018 3 groups of students were identified to take part in intervention sessions with the English HLTA every week. This took place from September 2017 and lasted throughout the academic year. 27 students were involved in this programme in English and progress was monitored throughout the year.</p> <p>Mathematics 2017 - 2018 <i>Wave One</i> – Four catch up groups were created (two from each population) which was the equivalent two 22 students (8 PP). After the programme for wave one was complete ten students were able to exit the programme. One student was successful in class and through catch up to move up into a higher maths set. <i>Wave Two</i> - Only two more groups were required (one from each population) for the programme for the remaining 11 students (5 PP and one student left the school). In place additional most able interventions were created with a priority on underachieving PP students.</p> <p>Overall attendance for catch up sessions across the year: 94% (96% if we remove a student who could not attend due to IE). PP and nPP attendance in line with each other. Catch Up Programme Assessment Improvement: Students improved by an average of 33% on the catch up topics alone. PP and nPP assessment data gap of 0%. Data Point Progress: Each student made progress from DP1 to DP4 – 58% were on or above their end of year target.</p>
