Craft Club






Jubilee Lessons

Honours students from Years 7-10 learnt how to Stableford score in the game of golf with Miss Shufflebotham and Mr Nixon.


They also enjoyed having a go at the game, chipping into the nets





The Science Department delivered an Honours Masterclasses this term on Medical Physics.

The students were taught about X-rays, CT scans and MRI scans. They then had the opportunity to take their blood pressure, check for colour blindness and have a hearing test. Some students measured the amount of oxygen in their blood using a pulse oximeter. It works by shining light through skin and measuring how much light is absorbed.





Corn-starch Christmas Decorations

Chemistry is all around us and plays a crucial role in many areas of modern life, including creating sustainable materials.

To positively shape the future, we all need chemistry and making corn starch decorations is an example of finding more sustainable materials to replace plastics made from non renewable sources.

To celebrate chemistry week Year 7 students had the opportunity to make some corn-starch plastic Christmas tree decorations. They did an amazing job!








Space Lab



Curiosity Boxes


British Science Week 2026 takes place from 6th-15th March, with the theme "Curiosity: What's Your Question?"

Students posted some amazing questions in November! Here are a few:


- What was the first ever animal?




Literacy Ambassadors

Specialised Training: Each student received training focused on promoting reading for enjoyment.


Student-Led Initiatives: They are now using these skills to plan creative ways to make our library and English department even more engaging for everyone.


The flame of hope began its journey travelling across 20 schools earlier this month bringing our community of schools together in the spirit of Advent.
